Ironstone Knife Rests in a Gothic Body Style

Collecting white ironstone can be so exciting. There seems to be no end to the types of items produced. David Klein provided this photo of a pair of unmarked, circa 1840s knife rests in a Gothic body style. Each is approximately 3 1/2" long and the ends are 1 3/4" in diameter. While these are identical they were purchased separately, ten years apart, and in different parts of the United States.



Knife rests were invented in the late 17th or early 18th century to save the knife, fork, and tablecloth from being stained by cooking fluids. They may have even existed in wooden form at the time of Henry VIII in the 16th century.

In the Victorian era, knife rests were created in a wide variety of designs, configurations, and materials, including glass, gold, silver, mother of pearl, and ivory. By the late 19th century, the need for knife rests was decreased because most knives were designed to be weighted towards the handle. For this reason late Victorian etiquette manuals mention that knife rests and worries about fouling the tablecloth had become unnecessary. In the Western world, knife rests were used at table through the first half of the twentieth century, mainly by the upper classes, but now usually are purchased mostly as collector's items. Another Wonderful Gothic Body Style!







Marked "Porcelain Opaque" this phenomenal circa 1840s Gothic teapot was found by Jeneen Berry. It is 12" tall to the top of the finial. Its tall, slender shape is unusual. The majority of mid-19th century white ironstone teapots are approximately 9" to 10" tall. Rarely does a teapot which is 11" tall or more appear.

Jeneen has researched this body style but hasn't found one identical to it, especially with that interesting flower finial which is original to the lid. After carefully comparing the octagonal configuration of the lid's interior lip with that of the teapot's mouth, Jeneen is certain that the lid is original to the teapot.

Jim Kerr has stated that he has seen an identical teapot a number of years ago but it did not bear a manufacturer's name. This body style is not in the data obtained by WICA from the National Archives in Kew Gardens.

Livesley, Powell & Co. Body Style The Union Shape, Registered September 5, 1857



Manufactured by Livesley, Powell & Co. this gorgeous large vegetable tureen base was found by Boyd Payne. The top surface is 9" x 12" and it is 4" tall. Imagine the magnificence of the lid!



A photo of a 13" tall ewer in this body style is on page 53 of White Ironstone Pitchers, An Identification Guide by Ernie and Bev Dieringer. It was submitted by the Kerrs. The mark was not legible.

This body style is not in the data obtained by WICA from the National Archives in Kew Gardens.





A fantastic impressed mark on the underside of this base features not only a diamond registry mark which translates to September 5, 1857, but an eagle in flight and the words "The Union Shape, L.P. & Co."



The eagle is carrying arrows and an olive branch as was found on the United States seal at the time this body style was registered.



The Illustrated Guide of White Ironstone China from A to Z identifies a Union Shape body style registered by T. & R. Boote on August 22, 1856. Its design is quite different from this body style.





Jim and Mara Kerr provided this photo of an Adelphi cream pitcher and sugar bowl along with an advertisement from the 1902 Sears, Roebuck Catalogue which included sketches of the same two items. The Crockery and Glassware Department featured a 100-piece set of "Adelphi" white ironstone for just \$7.75! Manufactured by W. H. Grindley & Co. of Tunstall, England, this pure white body style embossed with a dainty scroll design was intended to compete with Haviland china for which a 100-piece set would cost \$19.82.

Imagine the housewife's excitement as she unpacked her new dinnerware from a shipping barrel weighing 100 pounds. The contents included 12 each of dinner plates, breakfast plates, tea plates, sauce plates, individual butter plates (butter pats), tea cups and saucers and one each of the following: two-piece covered vegetable dish, oval and round open vegetable dishes, two-piece sugar bowl, 12" platter, sauce boat, pickle dish, slop bowl (waste bowl), 3-piece butter dish, quart size pitcher, and cream pitcher.

In addition, the following could also be ordered: coffee cups and saucers for \$1.46 per dozen, regular deep soup plates for \$.94 per dozen, and coupe shape (rimless) soup plates for \$.99 per dozen.
