A New Fig Body Style and A **Fabulous Eagle Mark Stating National Ironstone China**

Boyd and Brenda Payne provided photos of a new Fig white ironstone body style in the form of a sauce tureen with attached underplate. This sauce tureen's smooth bulbous lines are similar to those of some body styles of the mid-1850s. An exact match was not found in the registry information obtained by WICA from the National Archives in Kew, England.

In Memory of Past Members


The spectacular black printed importer's mark on the underside of the tureen covers most of an impressed English diamond registry mark and the manufacturer's mark. It contains:

- A large American eagle holding a banner which states "National Ironstone China"
- Elements of the Great Seal of the United States—a left-facing eagle, an olive branch, the shield, and the phrase "e pluribus unum," which translates to "out of many, one."
- The name of very prominent New York importer E. V. Haughwout





While researching the mark, Jim and Mara Kerr recalled a September 27, 2020, post on the White Ironstone Collectors Facebook page by Paul R. P. Fitch. Included were photos of an identical E. V. Haughwout mark on a gorgeous Pearl Sydenham white ironstone pitcher decorated with gold and red and blue stripes. Pearl Sydenham was a body style of the 1850s and possibly into the early 1860s manufactured by several firms including J. & G. Meakin, G. Wooliscroft, John Alcock (Cora Shape), Elsmore & Forster, and E. & C. Challinor. (See *WIN*, Volume 28, No. 1, July 2021.)





About Eder Vreeland Haughwout

Between 1832 and 1870, E. V. Haughwout of New York City was associated with several businesses which imported china, cut glass, silver, and other commodities. One business expanded to include china decorating in approximately 1848.

Between 1832 and 1838 E. V. Haughwout and his father owned P. N. Haughwout & Son at 591 Broadway in New York. In 1838, two years after his marriage to Elizabeth Woram, he partnered with his father-in-law William Woram to form Woram and Haughwout which operated at 561 and 563 Broadway. The building had five floors; their China Decorating Works opened on the fourth floor in 1851.

Between 1852 and 1854, E. V. Haughwout and W. J. F. Dailey were partners; Woram was a silent partner. In 1853 Haughwout and Dailey exhibited at The Exhibition of the Industry of All Nations at the Crystal Palace in New York, which opened July 14. They provided a complete set of imported French tableware for the White House (President Franklin Pierce) for which their china decorating studio under the supervision of their managing artists Thomas Maddock and William Leigh had created and applied the design of a right-facing eagle with elements of the Great Seal of the United States. At the time Haughwout and Dailey was dissolved, Haughwout lost many of the china decorators to Dailey.

An 1854 *Music World and Times* advertisement indicates "E. V. Haughwout, Importer and Decorator of French China..." Stone china is also mentioned in the ad.

When Haughwout moved to the five-story Haughwout Emporium at the corner of Broadway and Broome Streets on March 28, 1857, advertisements identified the firm as E. V. Haughwout and Co. Haughwout had this building constructed with the first elevator to be installed in a commercial building. The building still stands.

E. V. HAUGHWOUT & CO.

On May 1, 1870, E. V. Haughwout and his son, E. E. Haughwout, announced their retirements. All remaining stock was sold at auction on or before May 18.

<u>Conclusions</u>

- The eagle mark with just the name "E. V. Haughwout" is no earlier than 1854 when the Haughwout and Dailey partnership was dissolved. It is unclear if the firm was known as "E.V. Haughwout and Co." between 1854 and 1857.
- The sauce tureen and pitcher body styles are similar to other body styles

registered in the mid-1850s and produced for several years, possibly into the early 1860s.

- The decoration on the Pearl Sydenham pitcher and the eagle marks may have been applied by the E. V. Haughwout Company, which was well-known for its china decorating studio.
- The "National Ironstone China" banner may have been used as an advertising reminder that the Haughwout name was associated with the White House china displayed at The Exhibition of the Industry of All Nations in 1853.

Jacob Furnival Grand Loop Hot Toddy Bowl on Tall Pedestal, Ca. 1850s



A hot toddy bowl on a tall pedestal is a rare find! Though known to exist, very few have been found. Rick Nielsen acquired the above Grand Loop example on eBay. In the above photo, note the shelf for a lid, which may have had a ladle opening. The bowl is $7 \ 1/2$ " tall and "12 1/4" x 10 7/8" at the outside lip. The shelf for the lid is "10 1/4" x 9".

Very similar in appearance is a Jacob Furnival Grand Loop compote on tall pedestal. It is $7 \frac{1}{2}$ tall and "11 $\frac{5}{8}$ " x 9 $\frac{1}{4}$ " at the outside lip. Both the hot toddy bowl and the compote have the same mark.


