The teapot on the right is by John Ridgway & Co. which was in business between 1830 and 1856. Between 1856 and 1858 Ridgway was associated with the firm Ridgway, Bates & Co.





The Gothic characteristics of this teapot are usually associated with body styles from the 1840s and 1850s. The faint impressed mark on the underside of this teapot states "Porcelain Opaque."

Comparison of Two Cameo Gothic Pickle Dishes English vs. American

Many people are familiar with the pattern Cameo Gothic which was first registered by James Edwards in 1847. It was then registered by J. Wedgwood in 1848 and also is found marked by John Alcock, Edward Walley, Davenport and Edward Clarke. No registration dates are known for the later makers.

In a recent auction lot that we purchased there was a Cameo Gothic relish dish marked by a different, possibly American, maker. This relish has a black stamped mark as shown with the initials "C.P." According to Debolt's Dictionary of American Pottery Marks this "C.P." mark is really a "P.C.". The letters P.C. or C.P. are shown in a simple monogram in the center of a variation of the British Coat of Arms mark was used by the Potters' Cooperative Co. The mark was used beginning in 1882 and for about ten years thereafter when the Dresden Pottery of East Liverpool, Ohio was organized as the Potters' Cooperative Co. There could be other possible makers who used this mark, but we would definitely say it is not English.

One question that immediately came to mind is why was a pattern being used by a potter more than 30 years after it was first popular in the 1840s?

The comparison of the two relish dishes shows that the "American" one is slightly smaller in overall size, but with nearly identical embossed pattern design, although less clearly detailed.

It is difficult to tell if the ironstone color on the two dishes is the same due to some yellow discoloration on the "American" one, but it does look to be more creamy white rather than the bluish white of the English piece.

New Body Style by T. J. & J. Mayer Gothic Sauce Tureen with Scrolled Handles

Boyd Payne provided the photo of this wonderful sauce tureen base and underplate. It was unmarked. Denise Schine solved the mystery by providing the photo and information from the National Archives in Kew Gardens, London, England.

This body style was registered on October 9, 1854 under registration number 97160 by the firm of Thomas, John, and Joseph Mayer of Dale Hall Pottery, Longport, Staffordshire, for the design of a soup tureen. According to Kowalsky's *Encyclopedia of Marks* they were in business circa 1842-1855.





A Look At Two Gothic Table Pitchers by James Edwards

Shown below are two circa 1840s James Edwards Gothic table pitchers from the collection of Denise Schine. Until she recently acquired the pitcher on the left, Denise had only seen the Edwards pitchers in the body style on the right. The pitcher on the left is just a bit different from the body style of her other Gothic pitchers by James Edwards.

- This pitcher is without any additional embossment.
- There is no leaf detail under the pour spout and under the upper attachment point of the handle.
- The spout is narrower and has a pinched appearance.


